

Pupil Premium

The Pupil Premium is money from the government to be spent on supporting

- children from low-income families who are currently eligible for Free School Meals (FSM)
- children who have been looked after continuously for more than six months by the Local Authority. (In 2012-2013 this will also include pupils eligible for FSM at any point in the last six years)

From September 2012, schools are required to report on how their Pupil Premium Funds (PPFs) have been spent. Schools are also asked to track and report on the impact that PPF have had on pupil attainment.

Mousehold Infant and Nursery is committed to ensuring that all of our children strive to reach their potential. We do however recognise that some of our children are faced with challenging personal circumstances which can unfairly restrict their ability to fulfil their potential. PPF at Mousehold is used strategically and pro-actively to narrow any gaps in achievement that have existed, or threaten to do so in the future.

At Mousehold Infant and Nursery School we have spent the pupil premium on

- Literacy and Maths resources to support individual children and groups of children
- Teaching Assistants to support individual children and groups of children
- Additional teaching support for some of our children whose first language is not English
- Music tuition and groups
- Key intervention for some of our Year 2 children

This has been very successful as can be seen by our results each year (see our on line Prospectus)
